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## Who Inspires You?

Dear Brothers,

I originally planned to write about all the collegiate brothers who inspired me, but this space can't even contain a small fraction of those stories. Instead, I'll tell you about Daniel Brauer (Eta Omicron/Northwestern State 2008), a brother from my own chapter who inspired me over a decade ago to stay involved as an alumnus.

During Daniel's interview at our chapter's membership review, I saw his commitment to the Fraternity as a young collegiate brother and the disappointment, even anger, that resulted from the "brothers" who had betrayed him. I can still vividly recall thinking, "This guy expected a great Theta Chi experience. The chapter let him down. He's the type of brother we have to fight for." Daniel inspired me to

be a better member and continues to impress me in his career and as a Theta Chi.

Lt. Cmdr. Brauer is currently the engineer on the USS Greeneville, a nuclear fast attack submarine stationed in Pearl Harbor. Daniel and his crew deploy on exercises — underwater — for up to six months! And you thought having a roommate in the chapter house

was rough?

According to his wife Kayla (who's been connected to him ever since her AOII sisters introduced them 13 years ago), Daniel continues to live the ideals of Theta Chi. Even after being commissioned as a naval officer in 2008, Daniel still found time to regularly give back to the Fraternity. When stationed as a professor of naval science at Old Dominion University in Virginia, he gladly volunteered to be an academic adviser for our Zeta Pi Chapter. Kayla shared, "I honestly think it was what he was most proud of during his shore duty."

In addition to a number of awards and commendations he received, the captain of the USS Greeneville recognized Daniel's talents as an exemplary leader and effective mentor. Daniel even had the opportunity to guide Lt. j.g. Blake Dwyer (Eta Upsilon/Texas A&M 2015) during his initial tour as a submarine officer...they didn't find out they were brothers until well into the mission!

Gentlemen, take a few minutes to think about that brother who makes (or made) you a better person or who encouraged you (either

knowingly or unknowingly) to stay involved in Theta Chi. Reach out to them and let them know what they did. It wasn't until pausing to write this article that I realized I never told Daniel the impact he made on my time in our Fraternity. While I'd prefer to tell him face-to-face, I don't think I could get through without tearing up with pride, then having to make jokes about it, and then forgetting what I wanted to say. So, I figured this is the next best thing.

Thanks, Daniel, for being such a great example of the usefulness of our Fraternity. You make me and Theta Chi extremely proud!

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

"I just passed my 85th birthday and feel as young as (almost) ever. I believe that the influence of Theta Chi was VERY significant to my growing up and the success I have had in life.

When I joined Theta Chi at San Jose State, I felt a bit out of place with all the athletes in the house. I understood that I was required to be "something" in the fabric of the school if I wanted to be a brother. I didn't know what I could contribute, but Theta Chi was one of the two best fraternities on campus and I wanted to be a part of it. I ended up

running for Junior Rep and then Treasurer of the Student Body. I was just an above average student and thus had to work hard to earn what I received. Everyone in the chapter encouraged me, supported me, and helped me accomplish my goals.

Looking back, this certainly meant something to me (and maybe helped the chapter) but everything was hard work. That work ethic and the achievements I earned, made it possible to help others in life. Later, I developed 2,000 apartment units for low income wage earners. Building self-esteem was part of the Theta Chi ethic. And I needed that!

So, a big thank you to our Fraternity for instilling and promoting excellence."

"At age 95+, I am remembering the value of my Alpha Zeta Chapter and House at the University of Rochester during the WWII days of 1942-1945 with a few examples:

As a freshman pledge, I was assigned to take special care of senior Lee Adams (1943), later to become a judge of prominence in western New York State. Theta Chi locally had financially supported Brother Freddie Fennell (1939) to the graduate program of the Eastman School of Music. In appreciation, I was one of those whom he would have backstage with him at the Philharmonic Concerts. In those early days, he played in the percussion section of the orchestra and would run out and tell me what to listen for in the next movement. Later he became the conductor, well-known internationally, for his Orchestra Band. Brother Arthur Frackenpohl (1945), later director of a nationally known music college, passed away recently.

Before going to medical school, I earned my meals in college doing extra work for the Fraternity. A close friend and I in Oklahoma enjoyed telling others we are Theta Chis."


## I Was Saved at the 2013 Rose Bowl Because of #myFraternity

"As a huge Florida State football fan, I traveled to meet up with Brooks O'Hara (Gamma Rho/Florida State 1978) and his son Sean (Theta Eta/Sam Houston State 2012) in Pasadena, CA, for the 2013 National Championship game.

Before the game, we went sightseeing around Southern California and later met up with more than two dozen late '80s/early '90s Gamma Rho alumni at a get-together at a bar in Huntington Beach arranged by Chris Berry (1993). It was great to reconnect with brothers like Tony Gill (1987) who traveled all the way from Toronto; Jack Monroe (1987) who was in his last year in the Marines before retirement; and John Stacklyn (1973) who had driven out with his wife Juliet to visit family and had secured tickets with his pledge brother Bob Sasser (1973) and his wife Pam.

In the excitement of that amazing game, I missed a message that Brooks and Sean had to leave just before halftime to return to the hotel, because Sean wasn't feeling well. I now had to find my own way back to downtown LA! After asking multiple folks I saw after the game for a ride, there didn't seem to be any other option but to take the light rail link from Pasadena, about 3 miles from the Rose Bowl to my hotel! I got in line for the shuttle to the terminal to catch the rail and struck up a conversation with a couple of Seminole fans from Austin, TX, who had taken the rail out to Pasadena and offered to help me.

After standing in line for almost an hour, I finally made it to the shuttle. As I stepped on, someone reached out and grabbed my arm: 'The Helping Grab!' It was Greg Wicklman (1989), a Theta Chi whom I had not seen in more than 20 years and he said, 'Hey Allen Hallas, what a great game!' I agreed and quickly explained that I was trying to make my way back to LA and really didn't have time to chat because I needed to stay with the group who knew about the light rail. After a short ride, the bus stopped in front of a parking garage and I exited and headed toward the rail station.

Greg and his wife Lisa followed after me and asked if I needed any help. I was able to roughly explain my situation and he said, 'So you're staying downtown? We're headed that way and could drop you off, if you'd rather ride with us?' I thanked my new friends from Texas for their help and followed the Wicklmans to their car. We talked about the game and regretted that it was too late to stop for a few celebratory beers since we didn't really know the area. They drove me right to my hotel and we said our good-byes and they headed home for Santa Barbara.

I regret that the O'Haras and I didn't get to properly celebrate the victory and even moreso that they missed the second half of the most exciting Seminole game I had ever seen.

When I was initiated into the Fraternity in April of 1972, the fee was \$75. I know cab fare that night would have been pretty close to that amount. It still might be the best 75 bucks I ever spent, thanks to Greg and Lisa!"



## 2019 Alumni Corporation Forum: Building for Future Success

The Alumni Corporation Forum (ACF) is an educational event hosted on odd-numbered years which provides training and networking opportunities for alumni corporation officers. The 2019 ACF was hosted on July 12–13, 2019, at the International Headquarters in Carmel, IN. The event, formerly called the Alumni Leaders Forum, is fully funded by an educational grant from the Norwich Housing Corporation (NHC). It is free to attend; however, due to limited space, it is by invitation-only. This year's event was different from the past Alumni Leaders Forums as it did not include a track for chapter advisers. They now have their own educational event called the Chapter Advisers Institute.

Topics covered in this year's sessions included fundraising, reengaging alumni, trends in student housing, building and project management, house corporation best practices, and a review of the services provided by the NHC.

Following the event, Trevor Coddington (Zeta Pi/Old Dominion 1998) shared, "I'm pumped to say the least and look forward to supporting Gamma Theta Chapter and Theta Chi (as a whole) in the years to come." Kim Fisher (Delta Rho/NC State 1967) remarked, "Throughout the entire forum, questions I brought with me were all answered by the various presenters." Len Brunkey (Beta Zeta/Michigan State 1989) said, "Getting the opportunity to spend time networking with brothers from around the country is just a bonus on top of getting ideas for best practices."

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# Finding Yourself Amongst the Layers Of Line

Since earning an MFA from NYU in 1974, **Frankie Faison** (Beta Rho/Illinois Wesleyan 1971) has consistently acted on stage, film, and television with more than 100 credits to his name. On Broadway, he earned a Tony nomination for Best Supporting Actor in August Wilson's Pulitzer-winning play, *Fences*. His other Broadway appearances include *Getting Away with Murder*, *Of Mice and Men*, and revivals of *The Iceman Cometh* and *The Shadow Box*. Faison is the only actor to have appeared in all the major Hannibal Lecter films which include *Manhunter*, *Silence of the Lambs*, *Hannibal*, and *Red Dragon*. Other films in his impressive body of work include *The Thomas Crown Affair*, *Mississippi Burning*, *Do the Right Thing*, *Gods and Generals*, and *Coming to America*. His notable television roles include *True Colors*, *Prey*, *Banshee*, *The Village*, and HBO's acclaimed series, *The Wire*. We sat down with Brother Faison at his wife's café in Montclair, NJ.

## The Rattle: Tell us why you went to Illinois Wesleyan.

Frankie Faison: My older brother was playing football at the University of Illinois. When it came time for me to leave Newport News, VA, I knew I wanted to be near him. I looked for schools in Illinois that had a strong theater program and found Illinois Wesleyan. I went there and auditioned and met the people and enjoyed them and the rest was just the beginning of a wonderful experience. Ironically, my brother transferred when I started college, but that was good because it helped me to mature as a person by not having him 50 miles down the road.

## R: How did you first get introduced to Theta Chi?

FF: Joining a fraternity was an afterthought for me. I didn't really know much about fraternities, but it seemed like something to do, so I did. During the first week of school, you go from house to house and I really liked the guys at Theta Chi and they seemed very much like a group of people I would enjoy being with. I got a chance to pledge from Theta Chi and from one other fraternity. Remember, I came along in

1967/1968, still very turbulent times, racially. The fraternities at Wesleyan, including Theta Chi at the time, had been segregated. I found out later how significant my pledging was at that time because it was a racial barrier breaker for fraternities at Illinois Wesleyan.

## R: Did you experience any push-back?

FF: I never thought about it much, but it was something I had to deal with, and not just from the fraternity, but from the other organizations on campus, as well. People didn't really know what to make of me. I was free-flowing and I integrated myself in every aspect of college life that I could. As a football player and student actor, I knew people who were in athletics, music, academics—everywhere. I'm sure there was stuff coming from others around campus, but I remember when we traveled to different places to play intramural basketball, I stood out, but I never felt any discomfort or any challenges come from anyone.

Illinois Wesleyan had a very small black population of only of about 50 people. There wasn't a black fraternity at the time, but one started up the next year and I had already joined Theta Chi. Sometimes it was tough because the black community was like, "Why are you in the white fraternity? Why don't you want to be with us?" and I would tell them, "If you had been here at the time to pledge, I might very well have joined the black fraternity." When I went to college, I wanted to have a total experience. If you segregate yourself into small pockets, you're not going to be able to get to the diverse kind of experience that you want to have. I think Theta Chi totally broadened my life and my experiences by being a place that was different so that I could learn about other aspects of life. Theta Chi had a great group of people and I still hold the Theta Chi experience very fondly, very dearly in my heart. It helped me make that transition from high school to college. It was amazing and I always knew I had a family and a group of people who had my back.

## R: Are there any other challenges you remember?

**FF:** I had one incident in Theta Chi during my second year that troubled me for many, many years. Although it was a show of courage from the Fraternity to really fight

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to have me become the first diverse person in the Fraternity, I knew there were a couple of guys who had blackballed me. During weekdays, our dinners at the house were very formal and officers had specific places at the head table. Weekends were more casual and everybody would just sit wherever they wanted. Everybody did that all the time. I remember one weekend I was sitting in a seat where one of the officers usually sat. That officer wanted that seat and I said, "Come on, don't be ridiculous." He made a racial epithet towards me and I was furious. I was a very big, very physical, very in-shape guy at the time and I just wanted to crush him because of that. I thought, "You're my fraternity brother and you would say this to me?" The brothers who were there swarmed around me and played it off. But from that moment on, it was always tense between he and I. That incident stood out. It was significant and it was a growth spurt for me. In my acting, I draw upon certain emotional feelings and whenever I needed to draw upon an emotional feeling of a racist attack, I would always go back to that place. Eventually, it got to the point where it was too much of a burden for me that I just needed to accept, forgive, move on, and let it go. Other than that, I have nothing but fond, amazing memories and friendships. Even the other guy who blackballed me ended up becoming a very dear friend of mine because I guess he finally saw that you can't judge someone by the color of their skin.

## R: What are some of these fond memories that you have?

FF: The first two years I was in the fraternity house and it was just amazing. We had a pretty good basketball team, so I remember traveling and playing intramural sports. I remember doing serenades and singing Theta Chi songs—which still stick in my head—like "Dream Girl of Theta Chi." I had a great time pledging and forming bonds with my fellow pledge brothers. Since I lived so far away in Virginia, I remember going to different pledge brothers' homes for Thanksgiving. My Pledge Father Jim Gale (1971) became such a very close and dear friend. I hear from the guys every now and then and they've always been very supportive of me as a football player and they were even more supportive of me as an actor.

## R: Brothers came to your games and shows?

FF: They came to everything. They were such a supportive group because I was opening up new horizons to them as well as them opening up horizons to me. There were guys who weren't very athletic and they got a chance to come to the football game and there were people who weren't very arts-oriented, so they got a chance to come see me put on these outfits and act. It was amazing and a great exchange.

## R: Could you tell us a moment you were proud to be a Theta Chi?

FF: From the first day—the fact that they took the courage to break the racial barrier and go for somebody who they thought was a good fit for the Fraternity—that they closed their eyes to the color of my skin or my race. That made me tremendously proud; I was proud to stand tall with them because they were proud to stand tall with me. The moment that I was sworn in, I could see that they had really opened the door to diversity within the Fraternity.

The next couple of years there were a few more black pledges that came in, like Harold Eley (1973).

## R: How did Theta Chi help you as an actor?

FF: By enlightening me to different cultures and giving me practical first-hand experience with different types of people from various backgrounds that I may not have been exposed to for years. I could always be open and frank with my fraternity brothers about anything that was going on in my mind and vice versa. It helped me a tremendous amount and especially when I got a chance to share some time with the families, I got even more of an in-depth awareness. It just made me understand what I've always believed anyway: People are just people. You've got good people and you've got people who are not great, but people are people and as long as everybody is being courteous and respectful of one another, then you can move forward with life.

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R: What are your thoughts about playing Caliban in *The Tempest* and how you played it in college versus how you may do it now?

FF: The way I would do it now would just be a little bit more of an enrichment to the way that I did it then. Who I was back then and who I am now are light years apart and I've grown and I've had 50 years of life experience. I understand things to a much greater depth now about Caliban

that I didn't understand then. Then I was just sort of like going through the motions and playing the emotions from a much more outward sensibility, sensitivity. But now it would be much deeper inside of me and I would understand this character and why he was struggling for freedom and suffering.

#### R: What inspired you to be an actor?

FF: My inspiration to be an actor started when I was 6 or 7 years old. It came from the church because I was always doing the church pageants and welcoming the visitors. I was always interested in the theatrics of the pastor—he's up there and he can yell, scream, and be whatever he wants to be. I just always knew I wanted to be an actor. I would always do the plays in elementary school and high school and I was always encouraged because people saw that I had talent. I feel very blessed because I some-

times think if you know what you want to do at an early age, you get a bit of an advantage, or maybe not, but it worked out for me.

## R: Any films or TV that really affected you while you were growing up?

FF: Lots of Westerns. I was amazed by the talent on Amos and Andy—the way they could just hold and mesmerize the audience. Of course all of the sitcoms like Good Times and All in the Family. I loved television because I loved watching the arc of an actor and watching these actors transform, thinking that, "Hey, maybe one day I could do that." I never dreamed that I would, it seemed like a possibility.

#### R: Any other favorite plays or films?

FF: I remember watching James Earl Jones in The Great White Hope and being completely blown away by the power of acting. Another play that he did was an Athol Fugard play called Boesman and Lena which co-starred Ruby Dee—I got to see them perform every night while I interned at The Circle in the Square Theater the summer before my senior year. When I went back to Wesleyan, I knew that I had to return to New York soon because I wanted to be where there was so much vitality and energy in acting. A Raisin in the Sun with Sidney Poitier and On the Waterfront had characters that I could connect to. I also loved a production of King Lear starring James Earl Jones—I played a spear carrier. I was enthralled and drawn to all the classics. I was always interested in being a complete, wellrounded actor and knew I had to study the Greek classics and Shakespeare.

#### R: Who were some of your mentors?

FF: Dr. John Ficca, head of the acting program at Wesleyan. Harold Guskin worked with me at Wesleyan and at NYU. He was a legendary acting teacher and coached people like Glenn Close, James Gandolfini, Kevin Kline, and many others. Maybe James Earl Jones because I worked with him so early in my life and career. I realized what a great challenge acting was and I learned that he is always going to challenge you as an actor. I had to be at my best because if not, I would have been eaten alive.

## R: What is your method to select your roles?

FF: Depends on how much money I have in the bank. (chuckles.) Sometimes when the bank account is thin, I'll stretch and figure out a way to make it work, but as a self-assured, highly trained actor, I always said I want to do the things that I want to do. I'm not going to just do something for money. I've had some lean days and that

was okay. I have never done a role that I did not feel like I could stand behind. Every role I take, I look at the character I'm asked to portray and determine if there is something in there that I feel that I could connect to and bring some life to—something that an audience could learn from. I've been able to put together a body of very diverse work because I never wanted to be stereotyped into playing just this one kind of person. I think of myself more as an artist, an actor, rather than a celebrity.

#### R: Tell us how you prepare for a role.

FF: This evolved over the years. A lot of it goes back to my training and understanding that, we as individuals, are very complicated. There are so many facets of us that we never get to examine. That's why I wanted to become an actor, so I can examine those facets. Most people don't get a chance to do it. We all have good in us, bad in us, evil in us, amazing beauty in us, all that stuff. My job as an actor is to find out

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and define the character that I'm playing and discover what is already in me. I've never played a character that didn't have any kind of qualities that are somewhere in me. They may be very deep-seeded, but they're there. In order to play the role, it has to come from somewhere and it has to be real. But if I play a murderer, I'm not going to go out and murder someone. I'm not a murderer. I must have something in me that would allow me to play that convincingly and honest enough that it's believable.

This is my process: I examine the character and then I examine myself and I put the qualities of the character on one side and put my qualities on the other. Next, I try to find the qualities in me that are similar where they can help me to find the qualities in the character I'm playing and then I focus and I isolate them and they become very important to me when I'm playing the character. There are layers of me that get in the way of my playing certain things, so I have to get rid of them. It takes a lot of discipline to find the things that I need from Frankie Faison that would allow me to play a character, whoever it might be.

## R: Which characters are most like Frankie Faison?

FF: They're all like me in some way because they are me. I think of myself as being very affable, very jolly, pleasant. I think that people really trust me. This comes from my background being from the South—we were always very open and honest about the way we approached things and talked about life. Characters with open honesty are most like me. It's a character that most people relate to and I think it's one of the reasons I've worked so consistently in this business. I also always try to find humor in whatever character I'm playing because no matter what walk of life we come from, there's always some humor somewhere. I learned a long time ago to look for the humor in the character first and from that, move to whatever else is needed.

## R: What's the most grueling aspect of the production whether it's television, film, or on stage?

**FF:** It shifts from production to production. What you see is the finished product.

You don't see the many days, weeks, months, hours that have gone into making this one little moment come to life. Actors have to be in these outfits, remember the lines, and put so much stuff together. You don't see the person sitting out there for 12 hours all night in the bitter cold. I've had some brutal shoots—like Gods and Generals—it was so cold and I had to be out there all night long shooting. They take care of you, but that was brutal. That's no fun. Trust me, you wouldn't want to do that. I remember shooting Do the Right Thing, it was over 90 degrees every single day, and we're sitting out there on that corner. It's the extremes—from cold to hot, filming in the snow, and being on set for 18 hours straight and getting four or five hours [of sleep] and then they call you back in the next day.

Theater is a different challenge. You're indoors so you don't have to deal with the elements, per se. But it's the challenge of re-creating, on a daily basis, this thing over and over again. The play is the top art form as far as I'm concerned. I love the rehearsal process because it opens you up and invests in you as you play your character.

All forms of acting resemble each other. In film, you may shoot one to two pages a day. In theater, you have to do the whole thing, every night. It's full, it's engaging. It's a sensation that I can never get enough of. Acting is demanding because you have to go places in your mind that can be kind of scary sometimes and you have to maintain that level of concentration, for hours, for days, for weeks, for months, and sometimes for years, if it's a long-running play. It's been joyful. I speak of acting fondly because it's afforded me a wonderful life, a knowledge of who I am, and a better understanding of people in the world. I'm not so quick to put people into a box because I know that there are other facets of every individual.

## R: What do you think are some of the top challenges you had to play?

FF: If I'm doing my job and being as committed as I should be, it's just about every role I've played. Most of my challenging roles have come from the stage since theatrical roles are all consuming: playing Willy Loman in Death of a Salesman. Playing

King Lear. Playing Gabe in Fences. On TV, doing the role in Banshee was very challenging because I had to do a lot of physical stuff while also being there emotionally, intellectually as an actor.

## R: Are there any actors or directors that you'd really like to work with?

FF: I'm divided: since I'm getting older, I need to work with people who are secure in their work but I also want to work with young people and teach them because I feel that's my job, too. Anyone who brings an explosiveness of examining the character, play, and/or film are people that I want to work with. I've worked with so many great, brilliant people of all ages like James Cagney, Robert DeNiro, Sidney Poitier, James Earl Jones, Sharon Stone, Rene Russo, and so many others. I always wanted to work with Al Pacino and Steven Spielberg as a director—I need to let him know that we're brothers and maybe he should give me a role in one of his films! I've always had a great time working with people, so I don't care how big a name you have, if you're not bringing it to the table as an actor, I'm just not interested.

## R: You mentioned this long list of people—Do you ever get starstruck?

FF: No. Never have, not even when I first came into the business. The reason is because I know that once we get on that stage, on that screen together, they've got to bring their best stuff and I have to bring my best stuff. I'm prepared because I've studied and trained. I've always felt comfortable and felt invincible when it comes to playing against anybody. The only time I ever came close to being starstruck was when I worked with James Cagney because I couldn't believe it. It was pretty early in my career and I did Ragtime with him and I was like, "Damn, that's James Cagney!?" But then again, he had to say his lines, just like I had to say mine. He had to play his character just as I had to play mine.

## R: Who would direct and star in a Frankie Faison biopic?

**FF:** That's a question for the ages, because I love working with seasoned directors who've been around and are well-established, but I also love working with new directors, who are just coming to the fold.

And the star? It could be anybody. I love actors. In most talk shows, they always bring on the top-tier level star, but right underneath them—(where I believe myself to be too, more or less)—there's this body of actors who have supported the bigger names. They are some magnificently talented people who you may have never heard of. They're the ones that I would want to be in that film.

## R: How do you memorize all those lines?

FF: Oh, it's easy. You just do. (chuckles.)
If I'm doing film or TV, usually I'm only memorizing a couple of pages, but if I'm doing theater, it could be a lot more. How do you memorize the Lord's Prayer or the Pledge of Allegiance—your address or your phone number? Repetition and rehearsal.

## R: Can you think of something that surprised you as an actor?

FF: I always wanted people to like me as an actor. I've played a lot of fatherly, nice guy roles. When I started playing more sinister roles, I learned that people may like you and your work, but they're not necessarily going to like the character you're playing. My job is to portray that character as honestly and openly as possible. If he's a person who people despise, then I have to bring that truth to that character, too.

#### R: Advice for aspiring actors?

FF: If you're going to be a doctor, you can't just say, "I'm going to be a doctor," and go out there and start operating on somebody. You've got to go to school. You've got to get a degree. I believe the same thing about actors. If you're serious about it, take some classes and then go invest in a training program. You may find out that you're very talented in doing one thing and then you're stereotyped for the rest of your life—and that's pretty much all you can do. You'll also see how much work is involved—it's not just about the glamour and the glitz. After your training, carry yourself in an honest and respectable way. You've got to have some accountability as an artist. Be careful about what roles you say yes to because sometimes you can get stuck in something, and it may not be reflective of who you are. The longevity of an actor is something that's always registered with me. If you've worked 20, 30, 40, 50 years, that speaks volumes as far as I'm concerned. Just remember as an actor, your instrument is you. It's how you play yourself that comes across. You have to learn about yourself and then how to strip certain parts of your personality away from you so that your character can breathe and come alive.

## R: What are some of your hobbies and interests?

FF: Cooking is a very high passion of mine. I make my own homemade granola and used to do a lot of Southern food, but now that I'm married to a woman who is in food, I don't cook as much. I also love to just sit and watch and observe people because those are things that I may need to have and use. I love athletics—I'm passionate about tennis. I love to read when I get a chance but it's kind of hard, reading so many scripts. I love being out in the country with nature. Most of all, I have a passion for people. I love people. I think that comes from me being an artist. I never get tired of talking to people and finding out what they do. I find it exciting.

## R: If you had not gone into acting, what do you think you'd be doing now?

FF: Dead—I'd be dead now. I can't think of a thing in the world that I would be doing if I wasn't doing acting. I had thought about becoming a preacher or minister, but I don't think that would have panned out too well. I love teaching but I think I would have burned out. I love helping people, but I don't think I could have become a doctor; I don't think I was smart enough. Maybe a writer, but I don't think I'm quick enough, smart enough to do that, either. Acting found me and it's been a very happy marriage. I like having the freedom of not doing anything if I don't want to and the freedom of moving from one project to the next. I can't think of anything else that would have presented that to me. I think I was very lucky.

## R: If you could go back to a young Frankie at Illinois Wesleyan, what advice would you give him?

**FF:** Follow your heart. Be considerate, be respectful, and enjoy life. Be open to the

challenges that life presents because you never know what's around the corner.

That's the advice that was always given to me and it served me well.

## R: Any upcoming projects you'd like to share?

FF: I have a very exciting independent film that I'm very proud of called *The Killing of Kenneth Chamberlain*. It deals with a senior citizen who used his medic alert device and is confronted by the first responders. It's a true story and it was shot in documentary style. It was an intense two weeks shooting that. I'm very excited for people to see it. I also have a film coming out in 2020 called *The Grudge*, which is a remake of that horror film series. I also have a comedy film from Sony Pictures coming out called *Fatherhood*. So tune in: I have a comedy, a horror, and a drag 'em out drama that borders on tragedy.

## R: What's your definition of a Resolute Man?

FF: When I hear the term resolute, I associate it with very strong, affirmative, and positive action. I think it connects to all the decent things that we honor and respect. It doesn't cost anything to be a decent human being. Nothing at all. It's free. A Resolute Man adheres to those traits and in everything that he does and says because there is a responsibility that comes with that.

## R: Any message you'd like to share with Theta Chi brothers?

FF: Wear the letters and Badge with honor and a sense of pride. Remember you have a social responsibility. People are watching you. You need to take a very strong leadership role in your society, in your university, and in your life. If you see something that you don't agree with, or you can't be confident and stand behind, then say something because it's the only way you can learn, grow, develop, and carry on the Theta Chi tradition—a tradition that is well founded upon leadership and honor.



## **Extending a Helping Hand in Belize**

In summer 2019, **Davis Heck** (2019) and I traveled deep into the jungle of Belize with Drake University Professor of Law James Albert to check in on the work of a foundation that Gamma Tau Chapter supports. Last spring, Gamma Tau crushed our fundraising goal by collectively raising \$16,000.

The impact of this foundation is monumental. With the Fraternity's help, the foundation was able to send 200 students to attend high school this fall and 16 students to the University of Belize; provided laptops for four students; built a cafeteria so that when it rains, the 274 children can eat indoors and stay safe instead of seeking shelter under mango trees; and distributed hundreds of pairs of shoes so that children will not need to walk to school barefoot.

The conditions in Belize, especially along the Guatemalan border (where most of our scholars live), were extremely impoverished. There were many miles of live mine fields along the Guatemalan border including a demilitarized zone. We learned that if anyone gets too close to the border, soldiers will shoot on sight. In south Belize there was little or no running water. No electricity (some locations have solar power). No Internet. People bathed in rivers and ate on dirt floors. In many of the huts I entered, people owned very few possessions, but I never had trouble finding the schoolbooks that we provided to our scholars! People farmed mango, cocoa, corn, and rice and raised chickens, ducks and pigs to survive. They built their homes out of the rain forest, layering big palms on their roofs to keep water out of their huts.

We were inspired by the conditions that some of Gamma Tau's sponsored scholars overcame. We met Luenda who lives two miles from the Guatemalan border deep in the jungle. She walked two miles up and down a mountain, rain or shine, on a mud path just to get to a bus stop to

get to school. The bus picked her up at 5:30 a.m. while it is still dark. Luenda was the first female valedictorian at her school and was trying to get accepted into the University of Belize. She told me she doesn't have any place to live if she gets accepted but that didn't bother her. She said that she would happily sleep under a tree just to go to school. This 17-year-old girl cared about her schooling so much she was willing to be homeless!

A future project for the foundation is to lay 43 miles of fiber optic cable through the jungle to one of our schools in Corizon. The Internet will open up limitless economic and educational potential. **Tom Wrigley** (2021) is running point on this.

This foundation would not be possible without the minds of **Trevor Funk** (2012) and Prof. James Albert nine years ago and the work of Gamma Tau today. This year, **Jack Haben** (2020) will lead point on fundraising and **Hunter Edling** (2020) will run the media campaign for our philanthropy event.





(Zeta Epsilon/Long Beach State 1966)

Gordon T. Hughes is currently a partner, producer, and investor of theatrical productions on Broadway, London's West End, and other venues throughout the United States and abroad. He served as CEO of American Business Media from 1994 to 2010, where he shifted the association from a traditional publishing group to a global organization of business information providers. Prior to that, he served as President of the Marketing Division of the Outdoor Advertising Association of America, Vice President/Station Manager of WCAU-TV in Philadelphia, Director of Sales for KCBS-TV in Los Angeles, and as VP of Marketing for CBS Television for the 1992 Winter Olympic Games in Albertville, France.

Hughes has been recognized with two Emmys as a producer of sports and entertainment events, the Media Industry News Lifetime Achievement Award, and Crain's Media Business Lifetime Media Innovator Award. One of his current projects, the revival of  $\mathcal{A}n$  American in Paris, has won four Tony awards. Brother Hughes is a Charter Member of the Zeta Epsilon Chapter.

#### **Reflections from Gordon Hughes**

I have never been one to take a single path. Raised in an entertainment industry family, I have been in various disciplines of the industry for the past 50 years. Never one to be set in stone, I am curious to a fault. My career was always taking chances and building off what I had learned from the previous positions.

It all really began while attending Long Beach State where I was a Charter Member of Zeta Epsilon Chapter. I worked at CBS Television as an usher for The Judy Garland Show, The Red Skelton Show, and The Price Is Right. I then moved into CBS News where I worked for Charles Kuralt and Walter Cronkite when he was in LA.

Upon graduating, I was hired at the local TV station KNXT/KCBS Hollywood and worked in the newsroom on the assignment desk. I was later tapped as an associate producer for a local magazine show Ralph Story's Los Angeles. After that great experience, I decided I wanted to run a TV station and to achieve that goal, I needed to go into sales. After several positions and relocating around the country, I ended up back in LA as Director of Sales at KCBS. From there, CBS sent me to Philadelphia as Director of Broadcasting and, ultimately, as Vice President and Station Manager at the network owned and operated WCAU-TV.

After five years, I went to New York as Vice President of Marketing for all the CBS owned stations. I had 25 total years with CBS and received two Emmy Awards, a Columbia DuPont Award, and several



other awards. When you add up news, programming, sales, general management, and marketing, I had five careers at one company.

After CBS, I took a year off, fox hunted, and wrote. After becoming restless, I took an offer as President of the Outdoor Advertising Association of America's (OAAA) marketing division. My years of experience at CBS doing ad sales and marketing made me a valuable executive at the OAAA. I launched a major national advertising campaign that was featured in New York Magazine: "Outdoor—It's Not A Medium, It's A Large." The campaign was so successful that the American Business Press made me an offer. I was President and later promoted to CEO for a duration of 16 years. I used every tool I had learned in previous positions. I changed our name to American Business Media (ABM) in order to include online products with trade shows and other in person products. Our positioning line was "In print in person and on line." This was all about reshaping a traditional print association into a dynamic progressive entity.

I left ABM for what is likely my final act: Broadway. I started a production company called Direct From Broadway and have worked as a partner/producer since 2010. We have been involved in 11 musicals and plays and our shows have thus far won 11 Tonys. Our newest venture, Diana: A New Musical, opens March 2, 2020, at the Longacre Theatre on Broadway. Come From Away is a runaway hit in its third year playing on Broadway and is also running in London, Melbourne, Toronto, and 36 cities across the US.

One thing does lead to another if you let it. Here's some final advice from a brother: Look forward; don't look back unless it's to make use of the tools you have acquired over your career. Always be open to new ideas and always go for it.





## Zeta Upsilon Celebrates 50 Years at Hartford




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#### ETA LAMBDA/VIRGINIA TECH

#### Billy Gabor (Alpha Chi/Syracuse 1948)

May 13, 1922-June 4, 2019

Billy Gabor started at Syracuse during the 1942/1943 season and then left to join the U.S. Army Air Corp during World War II. Following the war, he returned for three more seasons. At Syracuse, he was the first to score 400 points in a single season and the first to score 1,000 points in his career. His record as Syracuse' all-time leading scorer stood for nearly 20 years. He was called "The Bullet" due to his exceptional speed. After graduating, he played in the NBA for six years with the Syracuse Nationals where he was named to the NBA's All-Rookie team, made the league's All-Star team (1953), and won an NBA Championship (1955). Syracuse University retired his #17 jersey in 2009.
